Thought you'd be interested in knowing just how the announcement of V.E. Day was accepted here in 1st Bn. -- the lack of unusual excitement of course was the most noticeable thing and that as we all know was due mostly to the fact that our V.E. Day was the day we pulled back from Dessau to Wippra knowing or least being told that we were through fighting in the ETO. Well at about 0847 on the 7th of May Major Curlee called Major Owen and said that V.E. Day had been officially announced by higher headquarters as of 0845. We recall that the Major gave a little In the Phillipines American troop whoop and a holler or somethin' and after telling the switchboard operator to notify the companies dashed up to Colonel Orr's office. The C.O. wasn't excited about the thing--just simply said, "Let's have a drink, Major," in just about the same tone he used when we had breached the Siegfried Line, or broke into the Cologne plains, or when we took Cologne, Bennie Mlodochowski was at the switchboard at the CP and called the news out to the companies. This was the response: Pfc. Karpowich answered at Hq Co and when told the news, merely remarked with all the gusto of a rumor doubter, "B---S---!" Sgt. Dumler answered at A Co. and said Crimean decision and by agreement "Is that the straight fact?" We don't recall who answered for B Co but he excitedly yelled, "Roger, I heard it on the party line when you told A Co., thanks"! At C Co, 1st Sgt. McCreary answered and after being told the announcement he said nothing -- there was just the sound of someone falling off a chair. Moobery and Watterson, battalion wiremen were repairing a broken line picked up the news on the test phone. Watty yelled, "Come on down "Moo", let's quit, it's all over! A KP at the kitchen at B Co tossed his scrub brush into the air. Most of us weren't impressed outwardly but deep down inside there was a feeling of relief. Around the Bn CP the realization of the real V.E. Day struck us when five minutes after we made the announcement, C Co's 1st Sgt. A great force of superfortresses from the Marianas today bombed industrial targets in the western outskirts of Tokyo. South of Japan Amer ican troops on Okinawa have made sma gains against very stiff opposition. The Allied campaign on Tarakan Island off Borneo is virtually over. Australian and Netherlands East Indies troops have reached the east coast and all the important points on the island have now been taken in Central Mindanao have captured Valincia and two nearby airfields. British heavy bombers of Eastern Air Command have smashed the Jap harbor installations at Ft. Blair in the Andiman Islands.

The Allied Armies in Germany have so far found about two and one half million slave laborers from various European countries. Over 40 per cent of them are Russians. About half of these people have been placed in some 200 camps and centers set up by the

Allied Armies in Germany.

In a statement on the Polish problem Marshal Stalin says it can be solved only on the basis of the among the Allies if three condition 1. That the Polish are observed. provisional government formerly known as the Lublin Committee should be recognized as the nucleous of a government of national unity. 2. That such a government should be friendly with Russia. 3. That the reconstruction of the Polish provisional government must be solved as Marshal Stalin put it, "Together with Poles

who at present have ties with the Polish people and not without them. **
