TO : The Adjutant General, U. S. Army, Washington, D.C.

A. Original Unit - Twenty-third Armored Engineer Battalion.

B. Appendix #1. After Action Report for the month of April 1945.

1945
APRIL

Narrative Report of Operations of the Battalion throughout the period.

The Third Armored Division continued its attack to seize Paderborn (W7047) and contact the Ninth U.S. Army, contact being made at Lippstadt (N4242). On 5 April the Division attacked East to secure objectives on the Weser River. Craters, abatis mines and blown bridges slowed the advance. All bridges on Weser River found blown. On 9 April the Division crossed the Weser and continued the attack to the East, encountering blown bridges and heavy craters along the routes of advance. On 13 April the Division attacked from positions east of Sangerhausen (D4725) to establish a bridgehead over the Elbe River. It was necessary to construct two bridges across the Saale River in the vicinity of Friedeburg (D7814) as all bridges were found blown. On 14 April patrols reached the Mulde River. Bridgehead forces were withdrawn to the West of the army limiting line (Mulde River), on 18 April. On 23 April elements of Division were relieved and started movement to new assembly area. By 26 April entire Division had been relieved and was in assembly area vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725) conducting patrols, rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment. At close of period the Division remained in this assembly area.

Company A was attached to CCA from 1 April to 25 April. During the advance to the Weser River it was necessary to construct and maintain bypass around blown R.R. overpass (O91470) while debris was cleared. A 36 ft. Treadway bridge was constructed at C110478. Debris of blown overpass at O906400 was removed and abatis just east of this position. Road blocks cleared in Beverungen (C1541). Abatis cleared from road at C136390 and C145350. After crossing the Weser River in the attack to the East a 48 ft. Treadway bridge was constructed at C714375 and a 72 ft. Treadway bridge was constructed at C756396. Fords and approaches were constructed at C6943. In the attack to secure bridgehead over the Elbe it was necessary to remove several mine road blocks and also to place friendly mine blocks. Log road blocks were removed in vicinity of Dessau (E1070). Company assisted in security of area and mopping up operations until relieved from CCA. From 25 April to close of period, Company was engaged in conducting security patrols, rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment in assembly positions vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725).

Company B was attached to CCB from 1 April to 17 April. During the attack to the Weser River muddy roads were encountered which required considerable maintenance to allow passage of the Combat Command. Removed Regal Mines from block at Langenthal (C1356) and road blocks at C120378, C184373 and C190364. Scattered mines removed at Haarbruck (C112372). Seventy-two feet of Treadway was used at C507554 to strengthen existing bridge for passage of Task Force. In the attack to secure bridgehead over the Elbe River a 336 foot floating Treadway bridge was constructed across the Saale River at D778438. Construction was started on approach route to bridge site for crossing of Mulde River at E1365, on night of 15 April, and bridging operations began the next morning. Due to heavy artillery and mortar fire construction was very slow and at 171800 April, construction was ordered discontinued. Company was also relieved from attachment to CCB, returning to Battalion control and assigned to guarding the Division C.P. Relieved from this assignment on 25 April and moved to assembly area vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725) and conducted security patrols, rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment to end of period.

Company C was attached to CC "Howze" from 1 April to 25 April. During attack to the Weser River road maintenance required the entire Company to permit passage of the Combat Command. On 8 April CC "Howze" crossed Weser River to the south of the Division Zone for attack on 9 April to the Northeast.

Appendix #1. After Action Report for the month of April 1945 cont'd.

Twenty-four foot Treadway bridge was constructed at 040229Z, and 60 ft. Treadway trestle bridge constructed at 054147Z. On 10 April a 48 ft. Treadway bridge was constructed at 082231Z. On 12 April a 24 ft. Bridge was placed at 024826Z. In the attack to secure bridgehead over the Elbe a 324 ft. floating Treadway bridge was constructed at 077745Z. Road blocks were removed at 075846Z, and in Kothen (D9258). Company removed scattered mines and placed friendly mine blocks in Combat Command sector. Assisted in security of Combat Command and mopping up of Combat Command area in vicinity of Dessau (S1070) until relieved on 25 April, returning to Battalion control and moving to assembly area vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725). Remainder of period spent conducting security patrols in area and rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment.

Company D was assigned to guarding the Division C.P. from 1 April to 17 April. On 17 April Company was attached to CCB, and was given the mission of removing that portion of the bridge across the Mulde River that Company B had succeeded in placing. Artillery fire had destroyed several pontoons which made it impossible to get the bridge cut without a considerable salvage job. Orders were given to sink the bridge which was done. On 21 April a 80 ft. foot bridge was constructed at 014555Z. Assisted in patrolling and securing the Combat Command area until relieved of attachment on 24 April. Moved to assembly position vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725) and conducted security patrols and rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment, and guarded civilian establishments to end of period.

Company E had bridging equipment in support of each Combat Command. On 8 April Company assisted 49th Engr Combat Bn in construction of 456 ft. floating Treadway bridge across the Weser River at Lehrden (O1347), and on 13 April assisted Company A and Company C in construction of the two bridges across the Saale River. Also constructed and operated a ferry at the southern site for crossing of M-26 Tanks. Company assisted Company B and Company D in construction and attempt at removal of bridge across the Mulde River (S1368). On 26 April began salvage operation to recover bridge equipment in Mulde River (S1365). This operation completed on 28 April. Remainder of period spent in assembly area vicinity of Sangerhausen (D4725) conducting security patrols, rehabilitation of personnel and maintenance of equipment. Throughout the entire period all bridges placed by the Battalion were removed by this company when bridges of a more permanent type were placed by Corps Engineers.

The Reconnaissance Platoon of Headquarters Company assisted the 83rd Armd Recon. Bn over its assigned routes during the operational periods by the removal of scattered mines and obstacles.

To the East of the Weser River many aerial bombs were used for demolition both for bridges and craters. Demolitions were not well planned and executed in many cases but did slow the advance of the Division for short periods.



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
